





WENDY TOOGOOD: NARRATIVES

This exhibition showcases Wendy Toogood's evolution over 40 years as a textile artist. Her early abstract collages show an affinity for graphic lines and bold colour, which is further refined in later works where symbols and figuration begin to emerge. In her ongoing series Nakusp Narratives, the collages become almost autobiographical as they map everyday activities like gardening or cooking. Toogood uses layered fabric, appliqué, and stitching or embroidery to create vibrant and imaginative small-scale vignettes that recall comics or Japanese manga.

FIRE IN HER HANDS: ELKE BLODGETT

Art Gallery of St. Albert, St. Albert, Jul 11 - Aug 10

Fire in Her Hands marks the debut retrospective of the late Elke Blodgett's visionary ceramics and celebrates her as an artist, kiln builder and environmental advocate. Blodgett, who came to Canada in 1966 from Germany, found comfort in nature. Earthy in weight, shape and texture, her raku vessels epitomize the delicate interplay between the planet's fragility and its resiliency. The ancient Japanese firing method of raku lends itself to creating unique hand-crafted pottery. For Blodgett, it opened the door to self-discovery and creative expression.

JESSICA SLIPP: WITH & OF (BECOMING ROCK)

Harcourt House Artist Run Centre, Edmonton. Jul 26 - Sep 7

Jessica Slipp, a Montreal-based interdisciplinary artist, explores the fusion between humans and the landscape with an immersive multimedia installation that includes video performances and paper sculptures. Enhanced by ambient soundscapes, the looping videos convey the cyclical nature of time. Paper sculptures, resembling rock formations, reflect Slipp's process of camouflaging herself into the landscape using digital prints of rock textures. Her work challenges perceptions of body and earth, advocating for a more empathetic relationship with nature amidst ecological crises.

Earth to Eternity & Landscape to Land Use

Art emerges as an ideal platform for reimagining and repairing humanity's shifting relationship with nature in new exhibitions at the Art Gallery of Alberta. To celebrate its 100th anniversary, the AGA presents a series of exhibitions to showcase over 100 Alberta artists in its permanent collection.

According to the AGA, "Many of the works in the exhibitions are rooted in conceptions of time." Some works signify change or movement through snapshots or sequential events such as seasonal shifts, erosion or repetition. Or by entangling viewers in different sensory, material, and imaginary temporalities and spaces.

Earth to Eternity features a diversity of artwork beginning with organic, earthbound observations like Samantha Walrod's painting Warm Grey + Red Radial, moving through altered land-

scapes, and finally arriving at works of pure abstraction that allude to universal truths and the subliminal. For example, Ihor Dmytruk's repetitive geometric painting #14 uses patterns and the grid to organize space, colour and time, luring viewers to optically navigate the space.

In contrast, *Landscape to Land Use* offers viewers a glimpse into how humans "live on, with, and take away from the land over time." Some works capture urban and rural life in Alberta while others showcase the province's diverse territories, from its rugged boreal forest to the great plains and majestic Rocky Mountains. From there, nature is juxtaposed against human interventions with works that explore how the landscape has been altered or deeply scarred through colonialism, capitalism, catastrophic events and potential dystopias.

One powerful work is *Lubicon* (1988), created by Indigenous artist Alex Janvier during the Lubicon Lake Cree Nation conflict over resource extraction in traditional territory. What began as Janvier's signature white-ground painting has been obliterated by a fierce red that conveys his mounting rage over the land dispute.

Both exhibitions offer an impressive range of contemporary approaches to nature, artifice and the sublime while providing a valuable opportunity to view these works from the collection in a new and intriguing context.



Taking its title from the Secwépemctsin word for "tree," *Tsrep* is a group exhibition that addresses the effects of colonization, unsustainable land development, and the climate crisis on the ancestral and unceded territories of the Secwépemc people. Salmon Arm's art gallery, writes curator Tracey Kutschker at the opening of

the exhibition catalogue, "is situated on land that was once a forest of fir trees, not far from the lakeshore that would have been thick with tule and surrounded by sxwesmélip, the sxúsem berry bush that drew gatherers from all over the region since time immemorial."

Kutschker notes that when seeking solutions to the climate crisis, we would do well to look at past (pre-contact) ecosystems and listen to those who have had past ways handed down to them. To make an exhibition in celebration of this past and the knowledge it holds, Kutschker invited artists to explore a single species of tree or shrub that existed prior to contact and draw attention to the conditions that allowed for its displacement.

Exhibition highlights include two works focused on the birch tree. In Mary Thomas' *Walk Along the Birch Trail* (2024), a backing field of unrolled birchbark carries a series of vertical photographs of birch trees taken at ground level, an open sky between them and their birchbark support. Are these trees dying, or simply wintering? Clea Roddick's *Paper Birch Scrolls* (2024) also hang vertically, but in this instance in support of the poems and charcoal rubbings that fall from them. Roddick's scroll works were inspired by two locations: a stand of birches near the artist's home and an ancient birch that survived the 2021 Queest Mountain forest fire.

Ancestral Dreams & Other Premonitions: Cindy Mochizuki

Born in Vancouver, BC, in 1976, Cindy Mochizuki is a fourth-generation (Yonsei) Japanese Canadian artist whose installations draw on animation, audio fiction, theatre and performance. For the first survey exhibition of Mochizuki's practice, KAG curator Charo Neville selected four works reflective of the artist's community-based, research-oriented approach to story recovery and the processes by

which her works are composed. A key component of Mochizuki's work is also its most variable: site specificity.

Of her more recent works, *Tides & Moons: Herring Capital* (2022) was commissioned by the Nanaimo Art Gallery and *Autumn Strawberry* (2021) grew out of a residency at the Surrey Art Gallery. Both weave themes that include pre-war histories of food production, marginalized Japanese labour in BC, and the wartime Canadian government's systemic racist policies deployed through confiscations of property and internment. These policies, Mochizuki shows us, continued post-war through justifications and official refusals to fairly compensate those who not only had their homes and businesses taken from them, but their family heirlooms and photo albums as well.

At the opening-night interview, available on the gallery's YouTube channel, Mochizuki mentions the confiscation and destruction of photographs following the events of December 7, 1941: how apart from "government-sanctioned photographs," life before internment was suddenly "pictureless." The same could be said of internment, where possession of a camera was forbidden. Thus, many of the images that appear in Mochizuki's installations come from remembrances shared by Japanese Canadians she called out to. She tells us: "You will find inside this body of work that I've leaned into animation as something that comes from the body. It's a repetitive drawn gesture of a story and it's a different way of upholding that image."





Unexpected Bateman

Now in his 95th year, Robert Bateman is as close as you can get to a household name when it comes to artists in Canada. Chances are, even those remotely aware of his realist paintings of eagles and grizzly bears will know him also as a conservation advocate whose prints have raised millions of dollars for environmental causes. But for Penticton Art Gallery director/curator Paul Crawford, there is enough we don't know about Bateman that bears sharing, that contributes to his relevance as "an important force in Canadian art"

Just as Crawford did with American painter and educator Bob Ross in 2020, he does with Bateman, starting out with what we know of the artist, then, through inventive exhibition design, teasing out what's hidden in the folds and creases. In Bateman's case, it is his artistic development, beginning with his impressionistic landscapes, as in *Belt Line Ravine* (1950), an homage to his early idol Claude Monet, followed by an immersion in abstraction, which, like his contemporaries Toni Onley and Takao Tanabe, Bateman left for the realist canvases we know him for today.

"Most of the work in the exhibition comes from the artist's personal collection or from gifts to family, some of it sculpture, some of it works of others, including his wife Birgit [Freybe Bateman]," says Crawford over the phone. Most unexpected are a quartet of works Crawford discovered hanging on the wall of Bateman's studio, behind his easel—one by Robert Motherwell, one by Pablo Picasso, one by Gordon Smith and one by Jack Shadbolt. "These," says Crawford without hesitation, "are definitely in the show."

A REFUGE: ARTHUR ERICKSON

MOA Reopens After Vital Seismic Upgrade

MUSEUM OF ANTHROPOLOGY AT UBC, Vancouver BC - Opening June 13

Established in 1949 at the University of British Columbia, the Museum of Anthropology moved to its current glass and concrete home overlooking the Salish Sea in 1976. Designed by local architect Arthur Erickson and landscaped by Cornelia Oberlander, MOA combines grand views of the Coast Mountains and architectural references to the Northwest Coast longhouse with visible storage systems that allow for sustained displays. Like all progressive museums, MOA has made some tweaks over the years. Its most recent edit was groundbreaking.

Faced with a seismic upgrade of its Great Hall, in 2019, MOA embarked on a \$40-million federal-, provincial- and university-financed rebuild overseen by one-time Erickson apprentice John Milkovich, in conjunction with First Nations communities and families whose objects and belongings are housed in the museum. In an effort to accelerate the rebuild, the museum closed in January 2023. Concurrent with its June 13 reopening are two exhibitions told from Indigenous perspectives, each covering a different historical period.

Co-curated by MOA's Karen Duffek and Ts'mysen/Haida art historian Marcia Crosby, *To Be Seen, To Be Heard: First Nations in Public Spaces, 1900–1965* is a multimedia exhibition that celebrates First Nations people in British Columbia representing themselves as Indigenous in urban spaces during years of a federal government–led erasure of Indigenous life through potlatch bans, residential schools and assimilationist policy papers. Making its West Coast premiere is Māori artist Lisa Reihana's *Pursuit of Venus [infected]* (2015), a 26-metre-long, 32-minute panoramic video response to the 19th-century French style of wallpaper *Les sauvages de la mer Pacifique*, which erroneously depicts encounters between Europeans and Polynesians as harmonious.



True Tribal: Contemporary Expressions of Ancestral Tattoo Practices

Tattooing is a cross-cultural practice that has been around since time immemorial. Until recently, popular cultural notions of tattooing were invested less in the sacred than in the profane, owing as much to white cultural hegemony as they did to non-conformity and deviant behaviour. Today, even the most anti-social skull is counterbalanced with a loved one's name over an arrow-pierced heart. We know more about tattoos than we ever did, enough that some of them are given and can never be bought.

True Tribal gathers together 30 years of Indigenous tattooing from around the world through the work of eight artists exploring ancestral designs and motifs—from their place in ceremonial protocols to new methods of implementation to the relationship of these practices to the reclamation of land, language and identity. The artists in the exhibition are Tristen Jenni Sanderson (Woodland and Plains Cree), Terje Koloamatanga (Tongan), Nolan Malbeuf (Métis), Mo-Naga

(Uipo Naga), Julie Paama-Pengelly (Māori), Gordon Sparks (Mi'kmaq), Nathalie Standingcloud (Cherokee) and Dion Kaszas (Nlaka'pamux).

Materially, the exhibition features projections, portraits of those who have sat for tattoos, cultural belongings that act as a three-dimensional visual dictionary for the markings, blood impression paintings, and an augmented reality component in the form of an app, whereby visitors can view tattoo designs created by the exhibiting artists. *True Tribal* was co-curated by Dion Kaszas and Mireille Bourgeois in collaboration with the curatorial team at the Museum of Vancouver, drawing from its collection of cultural belongings. The project is co-managed by IOTA Institute, a Nova Scotia–based art collective and creative agency.

Organized by and travelling from the Brooklyn Museum, *Copy Machine Manifestos* bills itself as "the first exhibition dedicated to the rich history of five decades of artists' zines produced in North America." Curating this exhibition is a multidisciplinary team that includes Branden W. Joseph, Drew Sawyer, Marcello Gabriel Yáñez and Imani Williford, who, using photos of zine makers, framed pages, vitrines, projections, and a DIY production and distribution play station, have artfully divided the exhibition into thematic sections.

Those interested in "The Punk Explosion, 1975–1990" will have access to Candy Parker's *Dr. Smith*, no. 1 (1984), while those curious about "Queer & Feminist Undergrounds, 1987–2000" can revel in Vaginal Davis' *Yes, Ms. Davis* (1994). Artists known more singularly, if

not ineffably, include Miranda July and Raymond Pettibon. For those interested in the zines of local artists, the VAG has created a reading room that includes the work of Ho Tam, Whess Harman, Erica Wilk, Cole Pauls, Cheryl Hamilton, Lisa g Nielsen and Liz Knox. The VAG reading room is "framed" by an artwork created by local artist and zine maker Marlene Yuen.

Accompanying the exhibition is the first comprehensive publication devoted to the exploration of zines. Co-published by Phaidon Press, the book includes over 800 images of zines and related works in other media. In addition to texts by the curators are specially commissioned essays by Gwen Allen, Julia Bryan-Wilson, Tavia Nyong'o, Alexis Salas and Mimi Thi Nguyen, on top of biographies of participating artists.

UVIC LEGACY DOWNTOWN, Victoria BC - To Sep 7

Vancouver-based artist Liz Toohey-Wiese says she—like many BC residents—became aware of wildfires as an ongoing concern around 2017, which at the time marked the worst wildfire season in the province's history. "As a landscape painter, first it was kind of the amorphous anxiety that wildfire smoke brings and trying to grapple with—are summers just like this from now on?" she says.

In addition to exploring the topic in her own paintings, Toohey-Wiese began to research other artists who were dealing with wildfire in their work. This led her to co-create the *Fire Season* book project with artist Amory Abbott, who is co-curator with Toohey-Wiese of the *Fire Season* exhibition at UVic's Legacy Downtown gallery.

An offshoot of the book, the show features 12 artists, primarily from Vancouver Island, working in a range of media and materials—from weaving to

photography, handmade charcoal, painting and film—as they explore various responses and collective sense-making on the topic of wildfires. "There's a dark humour and a grieving all at the same time. I guess that's one way to deal with the grief, is to make jokes about it," says Toohey-Wiese on the themes explored by the artists. These themes include the destructive and regenerative nature of fire, the divide between urban and rural communities, potential futures in a changing world, and the impact on First Nations communities.

In addition to the curators, *Fire Season* also showcases the work of Sara-Jeanne Bourget, Ana Diab, Kerri Flannigan, Jonathan S. Green, Jude Griebel, Colton Hash, Eli Hirtle, Sylvia McKelvie, Andreas Rutkauskas and Kyle Scheurmann. The exhibition also features archival materials and artifacts from the BC Forest Discovery Centre in Duncan, which contribute to the wider dialogue Legacy aims to spark around our changing environment and landscapes.







Norwegian-born, Seattle-based Eva Isaksen is known for working in various media, including collage, acrylic inks, graphite and monotypes. At times these works, like *Somewhere Around the Bend* (2024), evoke the modern grid, though it is never clear whether its appearance is a flirtation or a flight from it.

Mary Ann Peters: the edge becomes the center

Veteran Seattle artist Mary Ann Peters brings a raft of awards, residencies and fellowships to her debut at the Frye Art Museum. A monthlong stay in Beirut in 2016, to connect with her Lebanese heritage, resulted in two bodies of work, one of which, this trembling turf, was seen earlier at James Harris Gallery. At the Frye, these 10 drawings are joined by a site-specific installation, impossible monuments, which examines in various media the fates of refugees lost at sea during the Mediterranean migrations—forgotten, marginalized and ignored in the long run. Their submerged status is also symbolized in the exhibition title, the edge becomes the center.

As Peters noted in an interview with *Preview*: "Displacement is the major theme in both bodies of work, first the confirmation of disputed, unverified mass graves under a golf course in Beirut. I drew upon results of forensic archaeology when I imagined them underground, using white pigment on black clayboard. Next, I

learned of the inquiries of Yemeni fishermen in the Mediterranean discovering the remains of thwarted refugees. I created a twelve-by-two-foot panel covered in gold-foil survival blankets, placing marks that symbolize the bodies. These are the 'impossible monuments.' "

The darkened clouds and subterranean landmass imagery in *this trembling turf* were influenced by her research at the Arab Image Foundation in Beirut, a repository of over 600,000 photo-documents, some of which were infrared illuminations below the golf course revealing the mass burial. Much of the power of Peters' art is in what is omitted or implied, in this case the thousands of corpses concealed from international attention. By drawing attention to such crimes, she is both artist and activist.

Her art of the past decade continues from the original black, white and gray abstract paintings that first brought her acclaim. Now the deep recesses and voids are inhabited by today's dead—ghosts seeking recognition by Peters.

American museums are trying to change how they, and we, look at American art. Institutions seeking a broader audience are engaging curators and artists from under-represented and excluded groups to re-envision their collections. Tacoma Art Museum is the latest in our region to undertake this project, with [re]Frame: Haub Family Collection of Western American Art.

Comprising 300 works dating from the 1790s to the present, including important artists such as Frederic Remington and Georgia O'Keeffe, the Haub Family Collection doubled the museum's exhibition space when it arrived a decade ago. Today, it places the museum in a unique position to meet this moment of cultural reckoning. TAM curator Faith Brower describes the collection as "a wonderful starting point for considering art and ideas about the American West."

To create a new context for viewing these works, four guest curators have designed exhibitions that focus on groups that played important but under-recognized roles in the history of the American West and offer alternatives to the white man's version of that history.

In Finding Home: The Chinese American West, curator Lele Barnett addresses the history of Chinese immigrants in America and Tacoma. In The Abiqueños and the Artist, Patricia Marroquin Norby (Purépecha) creates a dialogue between Indigenous and white interpretations of the landscape of Abiquiú, New Mexico. Both Barnett and Norby juxtapose works by contemporary artists with legacy works from the Haub Family Collection. In Blackness Is... the Refusal to Be Reduced, works in a variety of media by Nikesha Breeze and six contemporary artists compose a counternarrative to conventional American history from a Black point of view. And for Nepantla: The Land Is the Beloved, curator Maymanah Farhat chose artists identifying with the Arab diaspora, who depict the desert landscapes of the American West in ways that challenge historical portrayals of the region by American and European artists.

These exhibitions constitute a major reinstallation of the Haub Family Collection. They should foster fresh viewpoints and inject new narratives into the history of the American West.

Scott Gellatly: My Wetland

Scott Gellatly makes oil paintings that are recognizable landscapes. While at times these landscapes break down into abstraction, they are so saturated in color that the eye puts the puzzle together, into things we recognize.

Gellatly makes sketches outside in nature. He works the ideas out in grayscale, to master the composition of the hills, land, and water that he sees. He then uses these sketches to make large oil paintings, which hang in the gallery this summer.

His images of wetlands burn with bright yellows and reds as well as

the expected greens. The paintings are seductive and yet energetic. Grasses are fluffed up, bursting with energy, and water reflects as cleanly as a mirror. For years Gellatly worked for Gamblin Artists Colors, sourcing pigments and developing new colors. As he told *Preview*, "That made me think about my painting and that color isn't just the describer of the subject matter, color becomes the subject matter of the painting. And landscape is the vehicle which I use to express that."

He developed a sense of the physical attributes of paints and pigments, the way a cook gets to know different spices. For instance, "A cadmium red is red, but it also has a great opacity, it has a density off of the brush that a transparent pigment doesn't have." Gellatly limits himself to using just six or seven tube colors for 95% of his painting. So what's his favorite color? "Cadmium orange." He says he does not use a computer in his work. "In my day-to-day life, I have enough ones and zeros I want to turn it off. I want paint on my hands and on my clothes."

He doesn't fool himself that photos capture every detail of his works. "I love the idea that paintings reward people who show up to look at them." A 52-plate catalog of Gellatly's plein air sketches, created between 2019 and 2023, is available now.


