cultural walls. As an immigrant,
Abbasi's work navigates "The Third
Space," as experienced by diasporic
populations. Pictorial space, where
his structures come to life, allows

for more mystery and illusion, a fluid realm where distortions find expression. These distortions, unique to each individual and group, are shaped by cultural and geographical migrations, as well as the impacts of globalization and the technological revolution. Abbasi immigrated to Canada from Iran and now resides in Edmonton. He has a degree in engineering and two masters degrees in art.



Confronting global conflict is a daunting yet essential challenge for human progress. In Witness: Histories of Conflict in the War Art of Bill MacDonnell, curator Dick Averns sets the tone for engaging with MacDonnell's paintings not as romanticized landscapes, but as stark representations of violence and civil collapse.

Over his distinguished career, MacDonnell has travelled to regions of conflict, including Vietnam, Congo-Kinshasa, Rwanda, Western Europe and the Balkans, accompanying Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Regiment. He was later deployed to Afghanistan as an official Canadian war artist during the War on Terror. These experiences solidified his engagement with the global impacts of war and shaped the philosophical and metaphorical complexity of his paintings.



One notable example is *Soviet Tank Graveyard, Camp Alamo, Afghanistan* c. 2008, where an acrid pink sky hangs over a vast area littered with rusty tanks. Framed as grim war remnants, the tanks are haunting testaments

to the folly of empire-building. A large white X punctuates the scene, both as a warning and as a jarring reminder of the scars left behind from war and conflict.

Averns brings together a selection of MacDonnell's paintings that navigate wide-ranging geographies and combat zones. Curated to appeal to a broad range of people, these monumental works create an unsettling tension between the visible and the concealed, forcing viewers to reckon with the aftermath of conflict and loss.

Running parallel is the anniversary group exhibition *Far from Home: Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry 110 Years of Art*, which is curated by retired lieutenant-colonel Bill Bewick and honours the soldiers of PPCLI through more than a century of service.



Stories that animate us features the work of 13 artists—from those near and far, to those past and present. Central to the exhibition are works on paper inspired by experience either collective (oral histories, cultural knowledge systems) or of a personal nature (memories, imaginings, dreams not yet done with). While some stories align with generic categories like fairytales, fantasy and science fiction, others are process-oriented, focused more on methodology than on the narrative potential of the finished work.

The works of Old Masters such as Francisco de Goya and 1960s moderns David Hockney and Joyce Wieland can always be counted on to reward visitors with their uncanny contemporaneity, but among the exhibition's pleasant surprises are the works of those born when Hockney's and Wieland's careers were ascending.

Winnipeg drawing collective Royal Art Lodge were 2000s art scene darlings when their conflations of Beatrix Potter and Henry Darger caught the attention of collectors and institutions alike. Only more recently has the work transcended its coy, stylistic influences to depict an otherworld finally our own, a world punctuated by grief and rage. And in her "feminist sci-fi narrative" *The Floating Archipelago* (animation, 6 min 20 sec, 2015), Marina Roy's hypnotic stop-motion lyricism is as effective at moving the story forward as it is in animating its reader/reviewer.

Organized and circulated by the Vancouver Art Gallery under the Across the Province program, *Stories that animate us* is curated by Diana Freundl and Zoë Chan. Also included in the exhibition are artists Osvaldo Ramirez Castillo, Robert Davidson, Jérôme Havre, Ed Archie NoiseCat, Ed Pien, Cauleen Smith, Amanda Strong and Camille Turner.



Reshaping Collections: Where History Meets Art

CHINESE CANADIAN MUSEUM, Vancouver BC - To Sep 28, 2025

The way CEO Melissa Karmen Lee tells it, the inspiration behind the Chinese Canadian Museum's latest exhibition "actually came from being told no," she says with a laugh. Initially, the idea was to bring the University of British Columbia's Chung Collection to Vancouver's Chinatown, Lee told *Preview*. One of the foremost Chinese Canadian historical collections in North America, it contains about 25,000 rare objects, records and archives.

"They told us no because the Chung Collection is deemed a national treasure, and if you're borrowing it ... you have to have Class A museum status," says Lee, a process that takes between one and two years. To collaborate in a different way, the CCM bought a 3-D scanner and, with the permission of UBC, scanned objects from the collection and 3-D printed them at Emily Carr University of Art + Design.

"It's a really cool, innovative use of technology," says Lee. These pieces were then incorporated into new artworks commissioned by the museum from six Chinese Canadian artists: Morris Lum, Karen Tam, Howie Tsui, Chih-Chien Wang, Janet Wang and Stella Zheng.

The commission represented an opportunity to work with ceramics, says Tsui. One of the 3-D-printed objects he used was a *suona* or *dida*, a wind instrument often played in ceremonies like funeral processions. Using a plaster cast, Tsui made multiple clay versions that were later integrated into other forms. "Given that my work speaks to funerary practices by Chinese Canadian railroad labourers, they kind of linked up," he says.

The artists' new works, located on the gallery's first floor, use a range of objects and materials, from photography to penjing rock sculpture, inscription, illustrations and printed silk scarves. The exhibition also features animation, film and child-friendly wall text.

"It doesn't make any sense to separate history, art and culture. It should all be together in one museum," says Lee, adding that because this exhibition combines history, visual art and technology, it appeals to a broad range of visitors.

Shelley Niro: 500 Year Itch

Mohawk artist Shelley Niro's first major retrospective spans four decades and features more than 70 pieces, including beading, painting, sculpture, photography and video. In a documentary commissioned by Art Gallery of Hamilton, Niro relates the experience of returning to past works: "You don't see it for years, then you have to bring it back out and start thinking about why you made it and the circumstances it was made under. It's like a diary."

The title of this touring exhibition is from a work in one of Niro's earliest series, This Land Is Mime Land (1992). In her hand-tinted photographic self-portrait 500 Year Itch (1992), Niro assumes Marilyn Monroe's iconic Seven Year Itch (1955) position. But instead of standing over a sidewalk air vent, she is indoors, over an upturned table fan. The number 500 refers to the years since Columbus' "discovery" of America, but it is the conflation of colonial trauma and humour that could make this work as much a coping mechanism as it is an important work of contemporary art.

In her media tour introduction, VAG chief

curator Eva Respini spoke of Niro as someone who proceeds with "humour, hope and art." For her part, Niro spent as much time speaking of "the future" as she did of the works that brought us together and into the present. Of these works, viewers were treated to a carefully woven braid of family, land and language intermingled with laughter, multidisciplinarity and political philosophy. If there is a work that embodies all these elements, it is *The Shirt* (2003), a video and photo series that concludes with a familiar punchline but is, with all due respect, no joke.

Russna Kaur: Pierced into the air, the temper and secrets crept in with a cry!

Born in Brampton, Ontario. in 1991. Russna Kaur took a path to visual art practice that included post-secondary stops in biology, clothing design, and surface and textile design centred on architectural space. In a recent Vancouver Art Gallery interview, Kaur spoke of working with her mother, who ran an Indian fashion business from home, where she was exposed to "different textiles, and combing textiles to create movement

and texture." Eventually Kaur formalized her studies at the University of Waterloo (BA, 2013) and Emily Carr University of Art + Design (MFA, 2019).

"My practice is primarily in painting, though I use a wide range of materials in my work. Typically, my larger-scale works come together like a puzzle, so I paint on a variety of smaller surfaces that piece together to create these larger-scale compositions.... I also work mainly in abstraction, and that's something that's really important to me as a person and as an artist. For me, abstraction quite literally translates to thinking for yourself, and that's not always something that I felt like I had the opportunity to do."

Kaur's current exhibition presents work that challenges the ostensible neutrality of the gallery wall, questioning the line between the autonomous art object and its institutional support. That she does so with bright colours that extend beyond the canvas makes this questioning less an interrogation than something joyous, a liberation. "Oftentimes I think I feel through line, or I experience life through line," says Kaur near the end of her interview. Whether that's the path you take, the line you make, or the one you break, Russna Kaur is on it.

Vancouver, BC's passage from resource port to tourist resort has been a relatively quick one. Long-time residents talk of key moments in this transition—like the provincial government's Expo 86, whose advertising slogan "Invite the World" set the stage for a series of social engineering manoeuvres cloaked in a tourist campaign that boasted the province's "Super, Natural" attributes. It is "enchantments" like this that guest curator Phanuel Antwi and artists Rebecca Bair, Julian 伊中 Hou and Byron Peters appear to have set their sights on.

Although referring to Vancouver in general, the exhibition, according to its media release, focuses on "the way that Chinatown–Downtown Eastside ... enchants international capital, investors and tourists." In an effort to bring this to light, the artists and curator have taken a dialectical approach, a "counter enchantment"—from "reworking archival materials, to insisting on the lived experience of having relations in this neighbourhood, to mobilizing speculation, and fiction, to listening to the knowledge of the surrounding communities." The results are newly commissioned works in sculpture, sound installation and video poetry.

An exemplary work of Bair's is *Because They Were There* (2024). What appears at first to be a gathering of different coloured starfish on a rock in shallow water is interrupted by an unidentifiable white presence (the sun's glare?) and, secondary to that, a fainter veil-like presence that could be seaweed. The uncertainty of this latter presence allows the arms of a starfish to suddenly look like the fingers of a human hand, and what was once that (glaring?) white presence is just as suddenly irrelevant compared to the communion of those starfish that make up Bair's intertidal world.



Geoffrey Farmer: The Sound of Footsteps as Summer Walks Away

Geoffrey Farmer was part of a sunburst of Vancouver artists born in the 1960s who emerged in the 1990s, six of whom—Myfanwy MacLeod, Damian Moppett, Steven Shearer, Ron Terada, Kelly Wood and Farmer—were included in the Belkin Art Gallery's 1998 exhibition *6: New Vancouver Modern,* and all of whom went on to have successful art careers. Farmer, for instance, had a string of high-profile solo shows in Europe and North America, capped off in 2017 by representing Canada at the 57th Venice Biennale. After that, a period of relative silence.

For the past seven years, Farmer has been living on his estate in Kauai, Hawaii, where he has turned his attention to sustainable agriculture. Whether this exhibition of recent works marks a return to the art world is up for debate; what we do know is that this current show is part of the West Vancouver Art Museum's

ongoing series featuring artists from West Vancouver, and that Farmer's previous tendency to go big with his paper, wood and metal collage/assemblage installations was out of the question given the museum's relatively low ceiling and limited floor space.

Key to the exhibition is Farmer's interest in Carl Jung's Active Imagination technique, a play-based exercise that allows the subject to integrate contradictory psychological elements from their past toward a more balanced conception of self and a greater sense of becoming. In his realization of Jung's ideas, Farmer incorporates for his breathtaking dioramas deaccessioned books from the West Vancouver Memorial Library, which, it should be said, the artist and the museum recognize as an "in partnership" contributor.



John Feodorov is a Native American interdisciplinary artist of mixed Navajo/Diné and European ancestry who has been exploring a variety of themes through a range of media since the 1980s. Curator Faith Brower has selected work from various stages of Feodorov's career in an effort to represent that range, but also highlight themes that have been with the artist since the get-go. Chief among them, writes Brower in her curatorial statement, are "identity, power, spirituality, or the environment."

"In the exhibition, Feodorov's artwork poses many questions and considerations about life in America. He shares a personal and profound look at his experience never fully belonging to either side of his family tree, yet finding himself, as he negotiates

major power systems of colonialism, capitalism, and Christianity. Often using humor and parody to comment on paradoxes of power, hardly any of Feodorov's work is truly lighthearted in nature. Instead, the work points towards ironies of American culture and demonstrates how morally void, exploitative power deeply impacts people, communities, and the environment."

Feodorov's more recent mixed-media works on wooden panel (60 inches square), particularly those that begin with his 2020 Assimilations series, show a marked movement toward a quilted if not gridded system, as evidenced by painted squares and rectangles, occasionally punctuated by photographs and newspaper clippings. Some of these painted squares and rectangles could be called soft-edge, given their tendency to not stay put. Some of the rectangles contain within them an interior system of mortared rectangles, like the red brick wall in *My Life as a Suburban Ind'n* (2023).

Under the Inspiration Tree: Celebrating the Work of Thomas Wood

Thomas Wood (1951–2022), favorite son of Bellingham, could not have been more traditional in his main medium—classical printmaking—or more conservative in his representational genre subjects: landscapes, still lifes, wildlife, and beach scenes. At first glance, he seems to have never left town, settling down for long periods of time with his etching press, oil paints, nature sketchbooks, and hermetic fantasy imagery.

However, a closer look, which curator Amy Chaloupka gives us in the Whatcom Museum's first full retrospective of Wood's oeuvre, reveals widespread travels abroad that honed his various talents. These travels included residencies at II Bisonte, the legendary Florentine printmaking atelier, where he studied etching and ultimately taught, not to mention self-guided tours of European museums studying the Old Masters as well as trips to Africa, Venice, and a formative stay in the Gulf Islands in 1985.

Wood's prints—etchings, engravings, intaglios, lithographs, mezzotints and monotypes—were the subject of earlier retrospectives at the Museum of Northwest Art and the Whatcom in 1998, but this survey makes a strong case for the artist's extraordinarily fertile imagination beyond the multiples with trees sprouting magical figures, biblical allegories, hallucinatory flowers, and mock-mythological iconographies that emulate Renaissance artists from Albrecht Dürer to Hans Holbein, Hieronymus Bosch and Francisco Goya. Printmaking was the departure point leading to oils, pastels and collages that accommodated the extraordinary complexity of his vision.

Despite his reclusive worker image, Wood was widely published in magazines and art books and acquired by premier institutions such as the Philadelphia Museum of Art, Yale University, the New York Public Library, the Portland and Tacoma Art Museums, and Sforzesco Castle in Milan. Besides Florence, he exhibited in Venice, New York, Boston, Santa Fe and Nakhodka, Russia.

Joyce J. Scott is an activist-artist who chooses her media and materials deliberately, for their cultural references. Racism, feminism, body-shaming and gun violence are ongoing themes in her work. She presents challenging subjects with biting wit in a sort of bait and switch, drawing the viewer in with beauty, color and tongue-in-cheek humor, then confronting them with somber, scary truths.

This 50-year retrospective is co-produced by the Seattle Art Museum and the Baltimore Museum of Art. Scott was born, raised, educated and still lives in Baltimore, where she remains deeply rooted in her community. Her grandparents were former slaves. Her mother, the artist Elizabeth Talford Scott, learned the traditional crafts of guilting, sewing and weaving and passed them on to her daughter. Scott refers to them as her inheritance. Early in her career, she created clothing, quilts and woven textiles in tribute to this familial history. In The Threads That Unite My Seat to Knowledge (2024), Scott uses her heirloom family guilts to create a "storytelling environment" within the exhibition.

In the 1970s, a Native American artist taught Scott peyote stitch, a type of beadwork. She raised the technique to another level, producing her best-known body of work, a series of

sculptural necklaces and later, free-standing figures and tapestry-like wall hangings. A 1992 residency at the Pilchuck Glass School led her to combine beadwork with blown glass in sculptures such as Head Shot (2008). Sinister narratives lurk in these colorful translucent pieces.

Alongside her visual art practice, Scott created and toured solo and collaborative performance works presenting serious subjects in vaudevillian comedy skits, documented here in video footage and artifacts. In the late 1990s, Scott added printmaking to her repertoire. Prints from her Soul Erased (1999) and Obama (2012) series are on view.

Every aspect of Scott's art contributes to its meaning. The intelligence, creativity and passion sustained in her work have brought her numerous honors, capped by a MacArthur "genius" grant in 2016. Curator Catharina Manchanda describes the artist's "incredibly strong conviction that every artwork has a role in bringing people together and offering people an opportunity to learn together."

This 40-year retrospective gathers together more than 120 works by Joe Feddersen (b. 1953, Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation), a prolific artist known for his prints, glass-blown objects, weavings and ceramics. Ranging from miniatures to wall-sized installations, Feddersen's artworks are inspired by the signs, symbols and forms of the natural world and the world we, as human beings, have made of it. Feddersen often juxtaposes these worlds to humorous and/or poignant effect.

Among his most resonant smaller works is *Stripes* (2021), a blown-glass masterpiece 11.5 inches high, whose earth-, water- and sky-colored, horizontal and diagonal stripe pattern suggests a weave, but a nonutilitarian one. What Feddersen offers is not a basket that won't hold water, but a vase that could if it weren't in the service of something higher—as an artwork or a viewfinder, a visioning machine that provides a between-the-stripes view to the other side of itself, where together stripes align, achieve overtone, transcend.

Co-curated by Rachel C. Allen (Nimiipuu [Nez Perce]), curator of special projects at the Northwest Museum of Arts and Culture, and heather ahtone (Choctaw/Chickasaw Nation), director of curatorial affairs at the First Americans Museum in Oklahoma City, the exhibition is accompanied by a 200-page illustrated catalog published by the museum and distributed by the University of Washington Press. Contributors include ahtone, Allen, Anya Montiel, and past collaborators of the artist represented by a selection of poetry.

Kintsugi: The Restorative Art of Naoko Fukumaru

PORTLAND JAPANESE GARDEN, Portland OR - To Jan 27, 2025

Kintsugi is the Japanese art of mending broken things without hiding the repair work. The classic case is a broken ceramic vessel with gold lines that highlight the cracks, creating a new layer of decoration while disturbing our notions about throwing away damaged goods.

Naoko Fukumaru takes this 500-year-old art to the next level. The Vancouver, BC—based artist and professional conservator not only pieces pots back together, but she plays up her interventions with colors other than gold. She also mounts pieces in unexpected situations, such as attaching them to driftwood, and at her most creative, makes new objects and attaches them to the old, creating new sculptures.

Kintsugi means "golden joinery." It is supposed to enhance the beauty and value of objects by celebrating their imperfection and impermanence, according to Fukumaru. Pieces of pottery are glued together using layers of tree sap called *urushi* (a natural lacquer) and gold dust, which sticks to the sap. Finally, the surface is polished.

Kintsugi relates to the Japanese concept of *wabi-sabi*, in that there is beauty in the flawed, the incomplete and the impermanent. Fukumaru ups the ante. On one red bowl, she adds dots either side of her gold lines, so that they look like stitches along a scar. Elsewhere she takes deformed 19th-century bowls that slumped during firing and works on them while they are still fused to the brown supports from the kiln. In another case, she sticks one to the side of some driftwood, another substance that has been changed by time and stress.

The smaller Tanabe Gallery is reserved for her more avant-garde work, such as plaster casts of crystals emerging from a pot, a broken sea urchin healed with red thread and interior gilding, and a bowl with one side replaced by fabric, in another reference to *sashiko*, the art of mending with embroidery.

Carolyn Supinka, assistant director of exhibitions at Portland Japanese Garden, told *Preview* that the show "celebrates healing, mindfulness and the connection to nature," adding that it is something that the post-COVID world is craving. Supinka said she hopes garden visitors will be inspired by Fukumaru's art to think about imperfection and healing, and return to the garden with "a renewed sense of attention to detail and the beauty in imperfection around them in everyday life."

TSUKIJI IMPRESSIONS BY DEIRDRE KELLY. Victoria's Deirdre Kelly was an artist and a community builder. In 2008, she co-founded the Fernwood Art Stroll annual studio tour, and in 2015, the Gage Gallery. *Tsukiji Impressions* is focused on Kelly's fascination with Tokyo's Tsukiji fish market. Between 2015 and 2017, she exhibited her Tsukiji-inspired paintings and multimedia work throughout Victoria. The resultant publication contains commentaries on each work by John Hillian and an interview with the artist, who spoke of her desire to take the series to Japan. Kelly passed away in 2018.

JACK SHADBOLT: IN HIS WORDS. Billed as "the memoir Shadbolt never quite got around to writing," this book is indeed *In His Words*, though collaged by editor Susan Mertens into chapters, a compositional method that mirrors the painter's own tendency to borrow from Eastern and Indigenous motifs, European art history, local poetries, islands, forests and beaches. Those familiar with the stories of BC art know Shadbolt as a 20th-century hinge figure linking Emily Carr and Gordon Smith. This collection of his writing explores the artist as a civilization unto himself.

HIDING FROM THE NAZIS: THE ART OF JOHANNES KUNST. Although an artistic survey, this exhibition catalog emphasizes Johannes Kunst's life during the Nazi occupation of the Netherlands (1940–45), when he and his brother were hidden in the attic of their grandparents' country home to spare them from deportation to Germany as slave laborers. At war's end, Kunst and his family emigrated to the US, where he studied art, worked in design, and produced a body of mixed-media work that pays homage to his influences (Paul Klee, Max Ernst, CoBrA), but with a distinction born from extraordinary experience.

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
